This course enables students to integrate biblical principles related to organisational best practices, identify personal leadership styles and apply the effects leadership styles can have on given organisational communities in leading change. The Birkman Method assessment is integrated throughout the course to help students objectively assess their strengths, motivations, expectations and leadership styles.

All who attend the class (including those taking it for audit) are required to complete the Birkman Method assessment, if they have not done so before. The cost is S\$135 per person (not covered by any EAST promotions). EAST will contact the students on the Birkman assessment after class registration.

Matthew was the most popular Gospel account in the early church. It is loved for its emphasis on how Jesus fulfilled Old Testament prophecies, the visit of the Magi, the Sermon on the Mount, the invitation to the easy yoke, Peter's walk on the water, the Parable of the wise and foolish virgins, the guard at the tomb, the Great Commission, and many other unique passages. Matthew presents much of Jesus' teaching in five great discourses, making his Gospel account a discipleship training manual for the church.

EXPOSITION OF EPHESIANS

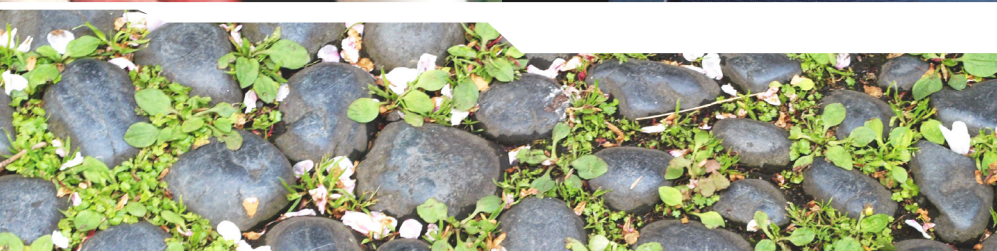

WORLD MISSIONS

This course introduces the exciting biblical, historical, cultural, and strategic perspectives of Christian world missions. Special emphasis is given to the expansion of Christianity, missionary methods used by key people, and lessons for today. Key subjects addressed in the course include how much of God's global mission has been completed, how much is left to do, how it is being done, and what He wants to do through His people.

HONOUR, SHAME, GUILT & SIN

This course is designed to help students integrate cultural and psychological understandings with biblical and theological principles and use these understandings to communicate the gospel in a manner that is meaningful to people of specific cultures. The course covers literature on honour and shame, shame and guilt, and sin from multiple theoretical perspectives and offers an overview of the ways in which honour, shame, and guilt, as a psycho-social-cultural construct, affect human functioning.

This is a class that looks at soul care or “soul training”, and how it is important to the believer’s on-going spiritual growth and formation. There will be guided studies on spiritual formation history and theories; understanding of God’s time, timing and places for us in rewriting our narratives; and how He brings about transformation through “indirection.” There will also be practical workshops on soul training, such as visio divina, meditation, and practicing margin.

The course is designed to equip the student in good sermonic outlining and effective expository preaching. A variety of sermon types and their development will be perused so that the student is competent to handle various types and/or genres of sermons. Special attention will be placed in the use of technology in sermon delivery. Students are expected to develop full sermon manuscripts as well as deliver a number of sermons using the principles learned in class.

CHRISTIAN MARRIAGE & FAMILY IN ASIA

Christians are living in a very challenging era. Everywhere we turn to reach people for Christ, familial and marital problems are overwhelming us with grief and deep questions like, "Why is the problem so prevalent around the world?" This course provides the biblical foundations and precepts relating to Christian marriage and family life. It also explores a survey of the existing major research findings of cultural values and challenges in marriage and family among representative Asian cultural groups.

BIBLICAL COUNSELLING IN MINISTRY

This course introduces foundational principles and techniques of a ministry of care and counselling, and a study of biblical, theological, and ethical aspects of counselling in ministry as well as common counselling concerns often encountered by ministry practitioners.

GREEK 4: ADVANCED GREEK EXEGESIS

Building on NT503, a study of advanced grammar and exegetical theories to enhance the study of the Greek New Testament. Students will exegete a New Testament epistle using textual criticism, word studies, structural analysis, and grammar.

NEW TESTAMENT EPISTLES AND REVELATION

HEBREW 2: ELEMENTARY HEBREW

Building on memorized vocabulary words and grammar rules, you will learn to read and translate simple sentences from the Hebrew Old Testament. Enrolment limited to MDiv Teaching and Exposition program students.

OLD TESTAMENT NARRATIVES

The study of Genesis to Esther highlights that the God of the Old Testament is the same God we worship today. It has been said that "The New Testament is concealed in the Old, and the Old Testament is revealed in the New." Many themes we find in the New Testament have their roots in the history of Israel. This study will help the student appreciate the unfolding drama of God's redemptive plan for man. Each book advances God's plan to raise up a chosen people and a holy nation.

EXPOSITION OF DANIEL

The book of Daniel is essential to understanding the entire Old Testament prophetic program as well as studies on end times and Revelation. This course will also focus on the nature and character of God and His dealings with mankind. The man Daniel, his life, his devotion and relevance to today's world will also be addressed.

THEOLOGICAL FOUNDATIONS

Overview focusing on biblical understanding and conviction concerning the major doctrines of the Christian faith, including the doctrines of: God, person and work of Jesus Christ, the Holy Spirit, the Bible, humanity and sin, salvation, the Church, death and resurrection, and future things. Class is limited to BA Level.

THEOLOGY 2

What does the Bible teach about humanity, sin, salvation, the church, and end times? This course examines each of those doctrines. It is intended to help students grow in their own biblical convictions and understanding of the Christian faith through a systematic study of theology.

SPIRITUAL LIFE AND TRANSFORMATION

Many Christians are spiritually impoverished because they don't know their identity and position in Christ. Students will learn their authority in Christ, how to resist demonic influence and how to help people find freedom in Christ.

**Alex Tang, PhD & MD,**

is an associate professor of Paediatrics in Monash University and consultant paediatrician at KPJ Johor Specialist Hospital. His PhD is in Spiritual Formation, Discipleships, and Education. He is a popular speaker, especially on ethical issues and spiritual formation.

Amy Lau, ThM,

graduated from Dallas Theological Seminary (USA), and has taught Bible and Theological classes since 2002. She served on the pastoral team at St. John's St. Margaret's Church before joining EAST as a resident faculty. Amy is a creative teacher who challenges her students to interact with God's Word critically.

Benson Goh, PhD,

has been a full-time staff with Cru Singapore since 1996. He has served in the campus ministry for nine years, three of which he was the director of the Great Commission Training Center (GCTC). He graduated from Asbury Theological Seminary in New Testament Biblical Studies in 2017.

Chan Chong Hiok, DD,

has served as Country Director of Cru Singapore for more than ten years, as National Campus Director and Area Team Leader for East Asia for 18 years, and President of EAST since 2011. He has an MDiv and DD (Transformational Leadership) from the International Graduate School of Leadership (Philippines).

Gasey Lok, DMin,

has been a staff of Cru Singapore since 1991. He has worked with campus students, and served in ministries for missions mobilisation and missionary care. He and his wife, Siew Leng, were missionaries to Japan for six years. His DMin is from Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary (USA).

Heng Hwee Chuang, DMin,

has degrees in MACE and DMin from Dallas Theological Seminary (USA). She has more than 30 years of Christian Education experience in the USA, Ireland, New Zealand, Singapore and East Asia. Her passion is for Christians to have a clear biblical worldview and be Christ-like servant-leaders in all areas of life.

Jacob Li, ThM,

holds a Master of Continuing Education (Adult Learning) from University of Calgary (Canada) and Master of Theology (Bible Exposition) from Dallas Theological Seminary (USA). He has taught at churches, para-church ministries and seminaries in Canada, USA and Asia.

Josephine Li, MABS,

was born and raised in Hong Kong. At 19 years of age, she emigrated with her family to Vancouver, Canada, where she studied Business Administration at Simon Fraser University, and Interior Design Management at the British Columbia Institute of Technology. In 2013, she completed the Master of Biblical Studies at Dallas Theological Seminary, USA, where she concentrated

on Women Ministries and Cross Cultural Missions. Josephine's passion is to reach out to and equip women, especially wives of pastors and leaders, for God's service.

Justine Han, PhD,

has served in counselling ministries in Korea, Japan, and the USA. She has served as a pastor of Women's' and Children's' Ministry for Korean-American churches and course tutor of Education and Pastoral Ministry in the Distance Education at Trinity Evangelical Divinity School (USA).

Kwa Kiem Kiok, PhD,

sits on a review board for medical research and a national level medical ethics committee. She served for six years with Graduates' Christian Fellowship. She co-authors a commentary on the book of Matthew for the Asia Bible Commentary Series.

Lau Ying Kheng, EdD,

served in Africa, India, Hong Kong and Korea as a missionary before she joined EAST in 2000. She has worked in student work, and publication ministries in Singapore and the USA, and in speaking and teaching ministries around the region.

Lewis Winkler, PhD,

joined Cru in 1987 and has taught in three seminaries in the USA and Asia. He enjoys interacting with students over basketball and casual discussion on how the Bible applies to life and issues today.

Nelson Lo, MDiv/EdD studies,

served in the Chinese Ministry of Philippine Campus Crusade for Christ since 1991. In 2000, he moved to East Asia, and served as a Campus Director, and later as Regional Training Director (Student-led Movement), City Director (Leader-led Movement), National Coordinator for Church Planting Network (Leader-led Movement), and Regional Leader-led Movement Director. He moved to Singapore with his Singaporean wife, Sophie, in 2011, and is now Dean of Administration at EAST.

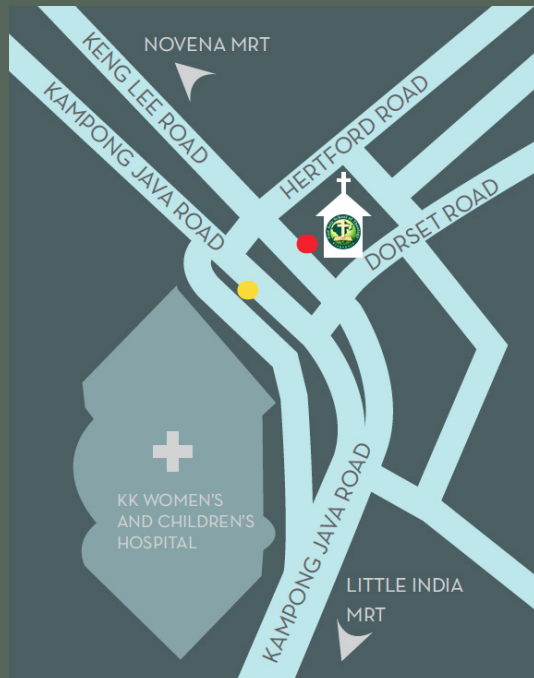
