Basic theological truths of hospitality, biblical anthropology, the three biological seasons of adult life, and three sequential stages of Christian ministry will be discussed in class.

EXPOSITORY PREACHING 2

OLD TESTAMENT NARRATIVES

THEOLOGY 2

What does the Bible teach about humanity, sin, salvation, the church, and end times? This course examines each of those doctrines. It is intended to help students grow in their own biblical convictions and understanding of the Christian faith through a systematic study of theology.



EAST MISSION HUB FUND RAISING APPEAL

ABOUT THE PROPERTY: It is a freehold four-storey commercial building located at 118 Joo Chiat Road. The gross floor area of 18,571 square feet provides the basic space we need for classrooms, administrative offices, library, teaching and ministry e-resources centre, worship and communal areas. The building costs S\$17.5 million. After much discussion with the board and EAST family, we felt we should, by faith, step into the waters and trust the Lord for the funds to purchase and use the place together with Cru Singapore.

OUR VISION FOR THIS HUB

A TRANSFORMATIONAL COMMUNITY: Besides being able to consolidate all our operations under one roof, we envision this to be a place where students can experience quality theological training and mentoring, where a transformational community may be built, and equipping of 10,000 pastors and leaders for the harvest field.

A DIGITAL FRONTIER: As the world becomes increasingly connected through the internet, we hope to build a studio in this place where teaching and ministry e-resources can be produced for our satellite courses. This will enable us to integrate sound biblical teaching with digital technology to capture the digital masses and net-generation.

A MISSION HUB: Through our theological-education-by-extension program and other partnerships, we have established five Extension Centres in three countries and 2 Partnerships in 2 countries, and are trusting God for a total of twenty by the year 2030. This will be a Mission Hub to send out our faculty and staff (to equip pastors and ministry workers).
