We at EAST have done all we could to bless you in your journey of learning; but only God, in His Sovereignty, could transform you holistically.



On behalf of all the faculty and staff, thank you for the privilege of serving you!





# Meet at the WELL

Jasmine Lee Wan Shan, 36 MDiv Christian Ministry Bethesda (Bedok-Tampines) Church

Four years ago, Jasmine Lee and ladies in her cell group started a 'Meet At The Well' ministry, which gathers believers from different churches for friendship and fellowship in the Word.

"The program centers around conversations that concern singles, within an informal setting of food, games, and spiritual encouragement," says Jasmine.

In a way, Jasmine's stop at EAST has also been a 'meet at the well' for her.

In 2015, while going through "a spiritually discouraging patch", she stumbled upon the 'Bible Study Methods and Hermeneutics' (BSMH) class publicity on line. "I'd always wanted to learn to study God's Word in context," says the Mathematics major from National University of Singapore. "Dr Keith proved to be very engaging, and asked questions that forced me to think."

That stop at the EAST well became a seven-year stay, where she met fellow sojourners who quenched her thirst for authenticity. One of them is her faculty mentor Dr Jeannette, "who is loving and hospitable, often inviting our mentoring group\* home."

"And if you shared a prayer request with her, she will follow up and ask, 'How did it go?' I talk about her so much at home that one day Philemon (Jasmine's husband) said, "O Dr Jeannette again?"

# Renovation of BODY, HEART and SOUL

Wong Choong Voon (Malaysia), 46 MDiv Intercultural Studies Cornerstone (Bahasa Indonesia) Fellowship

Twenty years in full-time ministry, former Cru Malaysia staff, now Chinese Timothy Mission worker who served among slum-dwellers in Semarang, Java, before EAST. Meet Wong Choong Voon, whose vision is to reach the majority unreached peoples in Malaysia and Indonesia.

"When I first arrived at EAST, I was all ready for hard work and discipline," says the Micro-Electronics Engineer by training and EAST Student Council President (2020-21). "But my engine was in very bad shape." Years of late-nights, no exercise, and poor diet, he confides, led to an unhealthy body, heart and soul. "These bad habits carried on in my student life."

The "turning point" came during his secondyear school break.

"Dr Lewis was going on a six-month furlough, so I asked to move to his place in the east. It cut travel time to school from the west by two hours," says Choong Voon. "To my surprise, he not only agreed, but offered us the use of everything, including his bicycles."

And so Choong Voon and his wife, Wei Ling, started cycling every day. "At first, it was to explore the neighbourhood for grocery; then the beach and favourite haunts in Bedok and Joo Chiat, where the best *ang gu kueh* ('red tortoise cake') is."

"For the first time in two years, we had regular exercises, and enjoyed our host country."

Around then, 'Soul Care' class started. One of the assignments was "starting the day on the knees or going for a walk without the phone." says Choong Voon. "Who would have thought these have became new habits that God used to change my body, heart and soul?"

Looking on and nodding is Wei Ling. "Now he is more relaxed, healthier, and has time and eyes for me," she laughs.

Choong Voon confesses that his old lifestyle stemmed from worries about not having enough or doing enough. "God reminded me that I came into full-time ministry because I love Him. He is my first Audience and Provider. Now that my engine is overhauled, I'm good to go."

Listening to Daniel Yoncer speak about his past, present and future plans, one gets a peek into a tender heart for people. "Back in uni days, my sis and I invited people to our home a lot, even people we hardly knew," says Daniel, who tells you he can whip up a decent escargot a' la Bourguignonne for his guests.

And the self-professed 'introvert' enjoys listening to people. "During the pandemic, God led many with needs to my path, and used them to grow my empathy."

In 2021, when travel continued to be restricted, Daniel decided to study to equip himself to help others. It has only been ten months and already much has happened, he says. "Mostly, it's been a journey of rediscovering my passion," he says.

Ten years ago, when his father passed away, Daniel and his second brother took over his family's "desserts and escargots export" business. "Work, in turn, took over my life; with time, I lived for me and my comforts."

God used "the small school, which is its strength" he adds, to take him back to his first love for God and people. "I learned to care for people again."

The Indonesian national who grew up in Singapore and did Computer Science undergraduate studies in California chuckles as he recalls his first week at EAST. "I was very disturbed when I was told to join a mentoring group," he says. "But the fellowship changed my priorities."



He is also grateful for teachers who sat down with him to offer wisdom, "especially Roy Tan," he says. "When I told him I needed to find my next step, he advised me to go back to the past, reflect on what God had done in my life, and seek Him for the future."

"He showed me how to find God's will for myself. It was what I needed."

Daniel Yoncer will pursue a Masters in Counselling upon graduation. He hopes to continue to minister to youths in his home church in Jakarta and offer counselling to those in need in the marketplace.

"It is with great pleasure, Daniel, that I get to congratulate you upon your graduation from EAST. May the Lord use you in ways beyond what you can imagine as you continue to take steps of faith and walk with him."



## From BOY to MAN

S. Zarni Pyoe Wai Saing (Myanmar), 35 MDiv Christian Ministry Judson Baptist Church Singapore

Back in Yangon, Zarni was 'king' at home, pampered by his homemaker mother. Dad was a trainer of NGO workers. "But I had three big bully brothers," he adds, laughing.

So when time came for studies in 2015, he was "shy a lot." Compared to older brother Htike, EAST alumnus and outspoken leader, he was a frightened little boy in the Lion City of Singapore. "My greatest fear was people would laugh at my weak English," says Zarni. "That led to problems like procrastination, missing assignment deadlines, and getting into trouble with my professors."

But God patiently worked in his life.

First, He gave him a friend named Boh (Park Boh Hyun who graduated in 2018), who was "just as shy." "We'd sit behind, hoping the lecturers wouldn't call us. But they always did (laughs); they also made us go for outreach." The most memorable of which was a Cross-Cultural Team Internship to East Asia. "Imagine my horror when we were sent to minister in an English college! But my English turned out to be better than that of students I met."

Another confidence booster for the talented musician-singer was being forced to go on stage. "One day, my pastor told me to join the worship ministry. I'd never sung or played the guitar publicly but I couldn't say no," he says. Later, he was roped into his church's musical-drama team as lead actor. "I literally shook before the thousands who came to watch us here and in Yangon; but when people received Christ, my courage grew."

Zarni is grateful for the EAST community who played a big part in his growth. "My lecturers, the chapel team, and fellow Student Council members I could joke around with in English!" He is especially thankful for his faculty mentors Rev Jonathan and Victor. "I confided in them about my insecurities, which led to anger issues; their prayers and love built me up."

God also used many classes to address his fears, a most recent one being a 'Shepherd's Care' counselling session. "Teacher Roy Tan showed me that my procrastination and even shame in speaking English were idols that I must confess at the cross."

"Only through full surrender every day will I grow up and be the man God uses."

"Zarni, by God's grace you did it! I always appreciate your heart that is genuinely generous, flexible, and ever willing to serve others. Your strength in music is complemented by your commitment to preaching the Word of God. Well done!"

# When i am WEAK

Yami Asai Shimray (India), 32 MDiv Christian Ministry New Horizon Church

Growing up in Manipur, India, 'fear' was not in Yami Shimray's dictionary.

At six, she fell into a river during a riot but climbed back up "to everyone's amazement"; at seven Dad passed away and she became Mummy's helper at home while she worked; all through university and Masters degree in Tourism Management, she worked to support herself.

Yami's foray into full-time ministry started with a four-month child evangelism training in New Zealand. Upon returning home, she travelled to different villages for three years to conduct children's ministry training and camps. Even when her savings were depleted, she did not give up.

It was around then that EAST alumnus Vashum Vareingam encouraged her to come to EAST. "From day one, I enjoyed everything – the classes, community, even the assignments," says Yami.

Then, in early 2020, Covid-19 knocked on her doors. "My room-mate fell very ill," recalls Yami. "And for the first time in my life, I felt intense fear." This fear escalated when Delta devastated India by December 2020. "Back home, many among my youth group, church leaders, family and friends were struck by Covid-19; some died from it. It paralysed me."



In her darkest hour, Yami's church in Singapore and the EAST community rallied around her." My faculty mentor Amy Lau took me aside and prayed over me for one hour," she shares. "Another teacher raised funds to buy food, medicine, and protective garments for healthcare volunteers."

And just as things started to feel 'normal' again in March 2022, Yami tested positive for Covid-19. "I was down with body aches and cough for a month," she adds. But God poured out His great love on her "through His Word, and through my dormmate and teachers who took care of me. One professor prayed over me at the gate."

"My instinct of dealing with crises was to climb out of the river by myself," says Yami. "But God showed me that courage is also waiting for His rescue. I learned that I don't need to always be strong or brave to serve God; but I must acknowledge my weakness every day and draw on His strength."

"Yami, I am so proud of you! Not only for your academic achievement, but for who you are! Praise God for bringing you all the way from Nagaland to bless us. May you be a vessel fit for the Master's use to impact lives."

Bae Jaeseong came to EAST to learn how to be a better leader.

The former Cru Korea missionary to Japan and HR Administrator says he was attracted to the school's leadership professors who are backed by a proven track record. "For example, our President, Rev Dr Chan, directed a fruitful ministry in East Asia for years; and Dr Roland was the national leader of Cru Singapore."

As he looks back to his three years at EAST, Jaeseong is grateful for the many classes that developed his thinking as a leader. "I'm impressed by Dr Lewis' class on denominations and theological views – what are the core and what are opinions; and Dr Samuel's 'Cultural Maps' for cross-cultural understanding. So helpful."

And professors do not only talk about 'Christlikeness'; they model love for God and students; this is what we need to see in my country, at home, in school, at church."

The Maritime Electronic Engineering graduate shares that his family "made many wonderful memories from small things" in Singapore.

"Memories such as hanging out with my mentoring group members and mentors Dr Benson and Dr Lewis, or playing ball with my kids," adds the avid tennis player and baker. "Jihye will miss the greenery and beaches here when we leave," he continues. "Me? I will miss many things including the warm weather, and char siew (bar-b-q pork) rice."

"Here's another important principle I learned about leadership," concludes Jaeseong. "I need to first be a happy and authentic human being, husband, father, and friend. Then I can be an effective and confident leader."

Such treasures included practical knowledge he could bring back to his three congregations of "first-generation believers" in and outside of Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia's capital city. "I have already started

teaching my leaders back home what I learned here, e.g., Bible Study Methods by Rev Jacob Li, spiritual disciplines by Dr Lewis, and Theology by Dr Raymond Go."

"I really like Dr Raymond; he would entertain my many questions – even disagreements – in class."

Another treasure is learning about humility. "I thought I knew a lot from my Bible school training and fourteen years of experience as pastor," Enkh continues. "God showed me how shallow my knowledge was."

"In my first semester, under the Christian Leadership module, Dr Roland told us to seek God for a vision and share it in class; immediately I told myself, 'Easy. I already knew that!'" But when he sat down to work on his assignment, Enkh realized his vision was "just a vague idea." To date, he has shared that presentation of church-planting in Mongolia with prayer partners "so many times that I cannot count."

He also learned humility from watching the faculty, adds Enkh. "They, including our President, would join students in outreach projects or share the gospel on the streets; this is great role-modelling to me, very humbling."

Of all his treasures, Enkh cherishes most his renewed bond with his children. "I used to travel a lot for ministry," he confesses, "and missed many of their milestones." "But here, I learned to swim from my eldest daughter, another of Dr Roland's assignments; hung out regularly with my first son for 'kopi'; heard my un-expressive and cool teenagers telling me, 'Daddy I love you'; and seen them grow in faith."

"I am a rich man."

As you have witnessed how God provided for you through the three years here, I believe He will continue to do so as you serve Him faithfully. Shalom!"

## HEAD, HEART, HAND




