In 2019, Kim Hak-Soo was invited to a chapel service at EAST. As the worship team played, he felt a deep connection with God which extended that short tour into a four-year road trip.

One of the first things that impressed the associate pastor of Korean Church in Singapore was "Servant Leadership." "I'd heard the term before," says Hak-Soo, "but at EAST I experienced it."

"Through the teaching of Leadership class professors like Dr Chan, through professors who invited us to their homes for meals, and the camaraderie of my mentoring group guys."

"I saw servant-leadership – the willingness to serve like Jesus – in action."

In early 2022, Hak-Soo's journey stalled when his wife Ok-Hee was diagnosed with cancer. What followed was an abrupt turnaround home for surgery, chemotherapy and hospital stay that lasted eight months.

"As I watched my wife suffering in pain, I felt helpless; some days I couldn't see or feel," says Hak-Soo. "My only GPS was God and His Word; my only prayer, 'Lord, I can't. You can. and I will."

The chemotherapy side-effects that tear into one's physical, mental and emotional states were things "I wouldn't wish for anyone," says Ok-Hee. "But I experienced God's wonderful grace."

"I could even pray for and comfort fellow patients who were lost without Christ," continues the trained Korean language teacher

Even when, she lost all muscular strength, she felt God's manifest presence. "I wasn't afraid to die," says Ok-Hee, looking up at her husband of 28 years.

"I just didn't feel ready to leave him behind."





By the time Ok-Hee's cancer was diagnosed, she had completed her two-year PIM (Partners in Ministry) Certificate course

Though she had graduated from Bible school 25 years ago, there were fresh lessons she learned from the PIM classes and teachers.

"Margaret taught me patience, and how to apply God's truth to practical life." she continues. "Eng Meng met me regularly for prayer and reflection and ministered to my soul."

"And Leetzu helped me in English, and encouraged me with kindness."

Having walked through the valley of the shadow of death, the couple is making no assumptions about their future. "My dream is to obey God's call," says Hak-Soo, "and expand His kingdom as a faithful Bible teacher and preacher."

For Ok-Hee, she is taking it a day at a time. "I just want to count God's blessings every day; and for as long as God allows, be my husband's partner in life and ministry."







The younger of twin boys grew up in Dangyang, a county of rice paddies, mountains and rivers. "I was talkative as a child but became an introvert when I grew up," says Hye-Won.

At 20, he moved to Seoul for university studies and felt God's call to serve Him. "I knew then I had to get out of my shell."

During that one year in Australia, Hye-Won's world changed. "The Aussie culture is very sociable," he says. "Shops shut around 7.30 pm and people would rush out to play or spend time with friends and family. This was something very new to me."

Back in Korea, while pursuing a Master of Divinity degree to prepare for ministry, he met Ji-Hyeon, his wife, "a bright and cheerful introvert."

They share a burden for youths in their home country whose lives are preoccupied with studies and worry about future employment. "They long for meaning in life but search for it through earthly pleasures," adds Hye-Won. "They need to know the abundant life that Christ gives."


Hye-Won found classes like Rev Kwok Wai's "Building Spiritual Movements" and Dr Raymond Song's "Contextualization" very helpful. "They opened my mind to how to connect with people effectively," he says.

The intercultural community also boosted his confidence. "I find it hard to open up," he adds, "but they would wait to hear what I had to say."

"I'm grateful to be part of a small group that prays and does ministry together, and for my mentoring group leaders; Rev Jacob is very empathetic and affirms me, and Dr Keith is very funny – his humour is infectious."

"I'm here for the ride," says Lee Poh Chin, principal-mentor of an international school ministry in Kampong Speu, Cambodia, before she came to EAST.





The PhD holder in Human Movement and Exercise Science from University of Western Australia wanted a school that prepares her to serve among Khmer people. "EAST has not disappointed me," she says.

"Rev Kwok Wai's teachings on 'Spiritual Movements' opened my eyes to the many ways of sharing Christ; Dr Raymond Song's 'Honour and Shame' class taught me to plant love, not guilt; and lessons on 'Soul Care' restored restedness to my soul."

In a world culture where people are preoccupied with life, Poh Chin finds EAST "refreshing."

This lover of children's classics and a good conversation appreciates how professors allowed her to "analyse issues for myself," and administrative staff who were ever willing to stop to help.

"I learned a lot from absorbing goingson around me," says Poh Chin, "and the many random words of wisdom." "Once Dr Raymond Song said in passing at



one of the chapels: 'Doing assignments is also worship.' I had just complained to God that morning about assignments!"

The 18-year primary school teacher in Singapore confides that she has also been inspired by her younger classmates.

"Brandon (Singapore) is a model of focus; Anj (Philippines) puts in 100% in what she does; and Mikeel (Philippines), he's full of service. In my first semester when we didn't even know one another well, he sent me links to files without my asking, and even wished me on my birthday," says Poh Chin.

"The journey at EAST has given me head, heart, hands – and may I add, new habits – to carry me back to the mission field."

Many classes at EAST have blessed Anj.

"Amy Lau's 'Bible Study Methods' taught me to study God's Word contextually," says Anj, "and Dr Jeannette's 'Teaching' class showed me how to write lesson plans."

"These and many other classes are important for my future ministry," she says.

But to move forward, Anj discovered that she had to also take a few steps back to "unlearn and learn."

"My parents separated before I was born," says the former film-maker and event-planner. "Because Mama loved us well, I didn't miss Dad's absence." But as she grew older, she grieved for a father's affirmation and protection.

"To cope, I resorted to denials, and approval from the world – even after becoming a believer," she continues. "Before I recommitted my life to Christ, I drank, smoked, and worked non-stop in the company I set up."

"EAST is the field where I found healing and bloomed," says Anj.

The renovation program kicked in as soon as she arrived in Singapore, when all visitors had to be in isolation for two weeks because of Covid-19.

"But I never felt lonely," says Anj. "Dr Roland (then Dean of Students) sent someone to check on me daily, PIM faculty Josephine Lam decorated my dorm room, and Amy Lau welcomed me at the hotel when quarantine ended."

"Through them I saw God's fatherly love, and felt like a child again."

And so over the last three years, Anj grew within the context of building relationships in the EAST community.

She is grateful for her "home" at the dorm, "sharing chores and praying regularly with the gals." She loves that many teachers "are like fathers and mothers," and shared their families with her.

"I love watching Rev Jacob play with his son; or eating ice-cream with Dr Roland and Ying Kheng's daughter, son-in-law and granddaughter; or observing how Dr Ben and Jo relate to their children, with no hiding of imperfections."

Besides serving for three years in Malaysia with YWAM and Open Doors, Japheth ministered among the disadvantaged in Darjeeling (West Bengal), and Mother Theresa's "Missionaries of Charities" in Calcutta for three months. He also served for a year in missions at Cornerstone Community Church in Singapore.

This early exposure has given him a hunger to "keep learning new things."

"God has used the welcoming community at EAST to expand my Christian worldview," says Japheth.

"My first dorm-mate and navigator, Mikeel (Philippines), softened my landing. Professors who let me ask questions freely challenged my thinking. And classes like Dr Samuel's 'Leading Multicultural Teams' showed me how to question my ethnicity in partnerships."

The self-professed extrovert appreciates the school's outreach program that involves both faculty and students. "Like ministering in Sarawak, and distributing gospel goodies in the school's neighbourhood."

"I love the emphasis on follow up."

As with any road trip, there were bumps along the way. But these, Japheth adds, were part of his education.

"The first school chapels were a struggle to me," he continues with a smile. "Let's say I was used to more expressive worship and prayers."

But God used the differences to build in him a deeper appreciation for diversity. "God wants to use diversity to fulfil the Great Commission."

Another disequilibrium was how he was taught to study the Bible. "I used to read the scriptures emotionally," says Japheth, "but here I learned to study God's Word in context."

"Recently I attended Amy Lau's 'New Testament Epistles and Revelation' class – it was taught systematically and contextually. But God's Word came alive. It was inspiring!"
